In addition, a pronounced research interest is indispensable as well as the willingness to explore demanding research questions in an interdisciplinary team. Excellent knowledge in English language as well as basic German skills are a prerequisite to participate in the programme. It is planned to involve the doctoral students into teaching and project activities of the institute.
